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PASTORAL LETTER

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SOME numbers have become part of our everyday language. We refer to something being available round the clock as 24/7. We refer to perfect vision as 20/20. And ten years ago another number entered our language – 9/11.



When you say ‘9/11’ people instantly know what you are talking about as they recall harrowing pictures of planes flying into the twin towers in New York, the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and a field in Pennsylvania. And a few years later in London, as numerous bombs exploded and more lives were lost, another

number surfaced – 7/7.

As the 10th anniversary of 9/11 approaches, I find myself looking back on that day and remembering the total disbelief I along with many others experienced as the events unfolded on our TV screens. It was a week that had started with high excitement for me, as I was to be ordained and inducted on Thursday, September 13th as minister of Banchory-Ternan East Parish Church. I was to be ‘preached in’ that Sunday by another minister, and so there was a chance to enjoy the moment as I had no sermon preparation to undertake that week.

And then, on the Tuesday, as I was listening to the radio, the news of what was thought to be an accident broke into the chat

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of the programme. I switched on the TV to see what was being reported, and like many around the world I found myself still there many hours later as the full horror became apparent.

The Wednesday then became a day of preparation for a service on the Friday, and I asked the minister who was to preach me in on the Sunday to stand down from that, because I felt that as your minister I should speak into this terrible event.

It's been a decade since ministers everywhere wondered what in the world to preach about on Sunday, September 16, 2001. Emotions were high and varied – there was shock, fear, grief, anger, uncertainty. And over this past week as I've watched various programmes about the events of 9/11, and the people caught up them, it was evident that the emotions for many were still raw when they spoke of the day itself and the immediate aftermath.

Oftentimes, when people encounter such devastating tragedy in whichever form it comes, many of us ask “Why has this happened?”... “Where was God?”

The first question may never be answered. But the second? Of all the mysteries of life and faith, none is harder to reconcile than the problem of suffering. How is it, we ask, that a supposedly loving and caring God can allow such evil and pain and misery to rack our world? Across the centuries greater minds than mine have wrestled with this question and yet failed to come up with a complete enough answer to stop the

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question being asked again. For there are no easy words or comfortable solutions – only the conviction of faith that God is there within our sorrow – sharing the pain; experiencing the grief; reaching out to the broken; suffering with those who suffer.

The Psalmist tells us that “The Lord is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit” - Psalm 34:18.

He also charges us to “Pour out your heart to God, for he is our refuge” - Psalm 62:8.

And in the book of Isaiah we are reminded that “the Lord gives true peace to those who depend on him”.

Time and time again we have heard that 9/11 changed everything, and I suppose in many ways it did – we have become more cautious and suspicious of others; travel is less straightforward with heightened security at airports; there is increased electronic and video surveillance; our passports now have embedded chips which contain details for facial, iris and fingerprint recognition.

Even in 10 years the role of minister is different to the one I came into, and the Church of Scotland is changing so fast, that sometimes it seems hard to keep up.

But not everything has changed. Again and again in Scripture we are reminded that there is one constant - that

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God is unchanging; that he remains the same yesterday, today, forever (Hebrews 13:8; Malachi 3:6; James 1:17).

10 years on, I am as convinced in my faith, as convinced in my calling, and as certain of the goodness of God as ever I have been.

In the coming weeks, may you experience in your hearts the peace that only Christ can give. May you know that whatever today may hold, whatever tomorrow might bring, that the future is secure, for Christ is with us, the same yesterday, today and forever.

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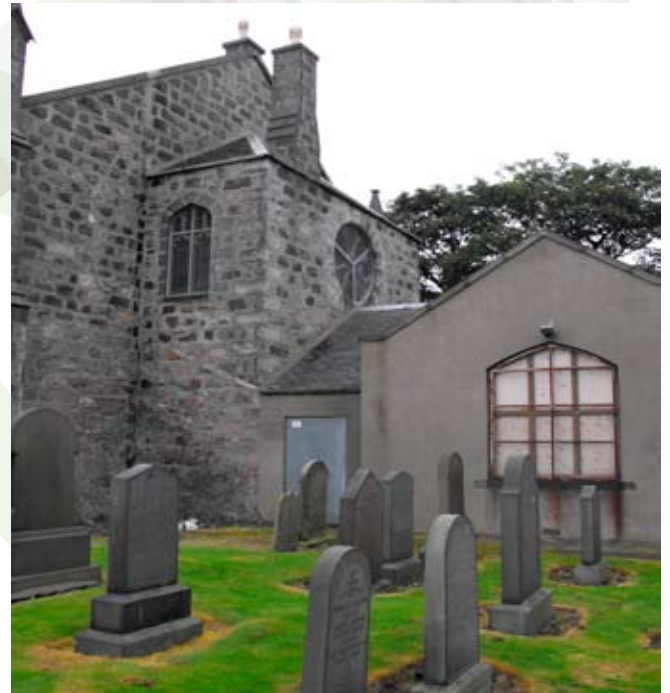
FROM THE ARCHIVES

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WORLD MISSION

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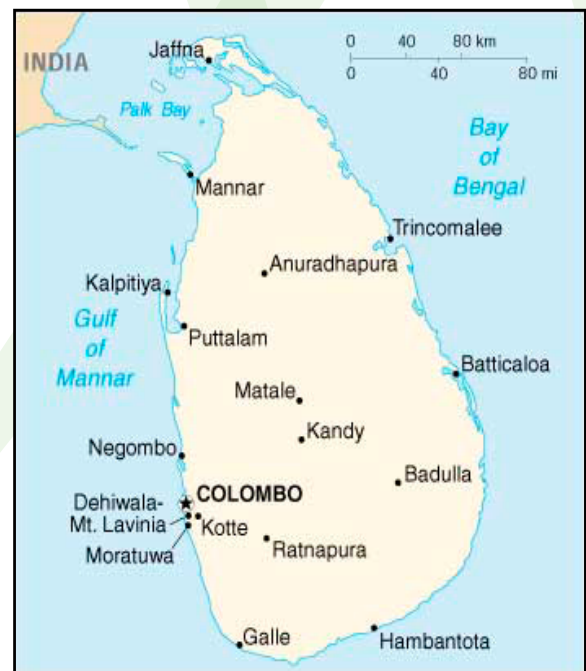
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WE haven't received any information from Kandy recently, so here is a little information about the city of Kandy itself.

WORLD
mission

Kandy is in the centre of Sri Lanka. It was the last capital of the ancient kings' era of Sri Lanka. and it lies in the midst of hills in the Kandy plateau, which crosses an area of tropical plantations, mainly tea. It is one of the most scenic cities in Sri Lanka, being both an administrative and religious city. It is the capital of the Central Province and also of Kandy

District. Within the city is The Temple of the Tooth Relic (Sri Dalada Maligawa), one of the most venerable places for the Buddhist community of Sri Lanka and all around the world. It was declared a world heritage site by UNESCO in 1988.



MESSAGE FROM BILL STONE

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THERE has been a problem with Hayley and my visa applications, and we've had to return to the US and re-apply for them here rather suddenly.

We weren't sure whether we'd be able to apply from within the UK or not, and so we called 121 to get their advice, and were told by them that it wouldn't be an issue. This, unfortunately, was bad advice and both of our applications were refused. Both of our churches, however, are being very supportive and have paid our airfare home and said that they are happy to have us back as soon as the visas come through. We were given ten days by the UK Border Agency to either leave the country or appeal the decision, so it's all happened very quickly, but will hopefully be resolved soon.

SCOTT HUTCHISON

MANY of us knew the late Rev Scott Hutchison. This, taken from his funeral sheet, was written by Scott:

My Grace is Sufficient for You
I was born into a home whose parents loved Jesus and His Church, so that as a boy I came quite naturally to love him too. Worship meant so much to me that I eagerly attended Church twice on Sundays, enjoyed teaching Sunday School and singing in the choir in Wormit. Prayer also became an essential part of my life.

All this meant that during my army experience in India, and my hospitalisation as a result of polio, I had a depth of faith that withstood the bouts of doubt and questioning such as 'Why me? Where are you Lord?' Wonderfully, through a year and a half of hospitals in India, on the hospital ship, Shaftsbury, and at Bridge of Earn, my sense of

God's power, and the support of folk praying for me, gave me the firm assurance that God would not let me down, and would help me walk strongly through physical weakness and the heavy clutter of callipers and crutches, etc.

My polio and with it the loss of physical fitness (the ability to play rugby, box, run, golf, dance and walk where I wanted ...) could have shattered my faith but I found myself believing more, loving more and ready to serve Him more. God was more than ever my real strength, who had wonderful plans for my life. It was with a great sense of eagerness that I started out on my new life. I knew that obstacles in His hands could be exciting opportunities. My own weakness became God's strength.

COMMUNION TOKENS

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A FEW years ago we introduced Communion Invitations in place of communion cards. Going further back, there were communion tokens and their use goes back to the very early days of Presbyterianism. The leaders of the reformed churches sought to introduce a system by which they could decide who should and who should not be allowed to communicate. It was John Calvin who first saw the usefulness of tokens in such a system. He wrote, “Each person should receive tokens of lead for those of his household who were instructed; and the strangers who might come, on giving testimony of their faith, should also receive tokens, and those who had none should not be admitted to the tables”.



John Knox et al were in close contact with Calvin and the practice of using Communion Tokens came to Scotland.

At times the tokens were retained by communicants and used by them for identification purposes. In a period of some fifty years ending about 1688, Covenanters were fined, jailed, exiled, tortured and violently killed, so that the showing of a token led to the acceptance of a stranger as a sympathiser and not a Government spy.

The picture is of one of our communion tokens from 1830.

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PARISH GROUP by Mary Paris

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YOU'LL remember that last quarter we had Part 1 of a series on the work of the Parish Group. The series continues.

The Short Term Visiting sub group was born of the need to identify members of the congregation who, following health problems, were no longer able to get out and about and might therefore be in need of a regular church visitor as outlined in the last article but was also a natural follow on from this, to show our care and concern for members going through difficult times.

Short term visiting is aimed at those who are unwell and/or have undergone hospital treatment. One problem encountered was finding out when a hospital patient returned home - some being transferred to Glen O'Dee for varying periods and some coming directly home from the Aberdeen hospitals. One solution was to visit Glen O'Dee regularly and see our members there and, after some difficulties, visits of this kind started in early 2006 and are still ongoing. Both Glen O'Dee and home visits are co-ordinated by Margaret Paterson and Mary Paris.

We still struggle to identify members returning straight home or via say Aboyne Hospital and those remaining at home so would always appreciate any help our members can give us. PLEASE contact Stephen Black, Isobel Brown or Mary Paris if YOU can help us to be the Caring Church we in the Pastoral Team are striving to be.

THE BANCHORY Advice Centre, a voluntary organisation has been providing an advice service to the local and the wider Deeside communities for over 20 years. Currently the service is being provided from two halls of the West Church. The number of cases processed by the Centre has been increasing through the years. The ethos of the Centre is to provide all manner of qualitative, non-biased, confidential advice services to all of the general public, free at the point of contact. The Centre has been fortunate in receiving most of its funding from Aberdeenshire Council.

The Centre is suddenly facing challenges from various directions and is badly in need of injections of inspiration and energy to see it through the immediate future. The Challenges are multiple and include:-

- the need to attract more volunteers to provide advice and/ or serve on the management committee;
- the need to update procedures to ensure that good quality service is being provided and can be shown to be provided;
- the need to provide training for the volunteers;
- the need for IT services;
- the need to provide a more secure facility to house the service and resulting confidential records; and
- the need to attract funding from funding organisations who regularly provide funds to the voluntary sector.

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Interest has been expressed in what the Kirk Session talks about!

Here are some notes from the meeting of 29th August (of course some things have moved on since):

Street Pastors – A call for volunteers had been made to organise this new initiative in Banchory. Some interest had been shown but currently nobody has committed for the initial year set-up.

Children & Families' Worker – The vacancy has been advertised and applications are still being received.

Youth Programme - The recruitment of a new youth worker is progressing. The applications received have been of a high standard and the process of selecting the preferred

candidate is well under way.

Seattle Visit – The youth group visit from Seattle went well. This was organised by Gavin Marshall, the Interim Youth Worker.

Annual Accounts – The OSCAR rules for submission of accounts have been relaxed which means we can revert to a simpler form of reporting the church's finances.

Presbytery – Mary Haddow is to be installed as Moderator of the local Presbytery, for 2011-2012, at a service to be held in the East Church on 6th September.

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ROOT CAUSES OF POVERTY IN THE WORLD

Food And Agriculture :

There are about 1 billion hungry people in the world yet there is enough food for everyone. Agriculture has the potential to end global hunger. Farmers in poorer countries must have access to secure land and fair markets. They must have a voice in the political decision making.

Health : Poor health causes poverty, undermines development and prevents people living full and productive lives. Governments in poorer countries must invest in healthcare, and international donors must fulfil their commitments to improve global health.

Inequality: Exclusion from political representation, land, work and services, because of gender, race, health, caste or religion denies people the power to make decisions about their own future.

Tax: Unfair tax systems in poor nations rob these people of a huge amount of tax each year and they lose crucial revenue because the international financial system allows multinational companies to avoid paying taxes, and money is held secretly in tax havens.

What is Christian Aid doing to help?

Afghanistan: working with over 50,000 people from some of the poorer communities.

Bangladesh: helping 7,000 women develop sustainable livelihoods and lobby for rights.

Bolivia: helping indigenous families in the Amazon to diversify their crops and sell

them for a fair price.

Cambodia: helping diversified flexible farming and access to fair prices and wider markets. Also working with tax networks to monitor government revenues

Egypt: supporting with the rights of small-scale fishermen and small farmers to improve yield and market access.

Haiti: helping to restore rural agriculture after the earthquake.

India: helping with diversified sustainable climate-resilient agriculture. Working with tax networks to lobby the government to fund a food welfare programme for millions of the poorest people through fairer and more transparent company taxation.

Jamaica: helping with new economic opportunities for ex-banana farmers, including pig and chicken rearing and vegetable gardens.

Peru: helping farmers improve agriculture to maximise production.

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Burma: providing healthcare and reduction of HIV, TB and malaria in remote regions.

Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, Uganda and Zambia: preventing malaria through net distribution combined with education and awareness raising.

Guatemala: helping families improve nutrition.

Pakistan: providing mobile health units for flood affected communities.

Peru: providing workshops on healthy nutrition and help with TB testing in impoverished communities.

Rwanda: helping fight HIV discrimination and involving religious leaders to reduce the HIV stigma. Increasing the numbers tested and providing support for HIV orphans
